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PART A- READING COMPREHENSION

Read the text about the legend of King Matjaž, one of the most well-known heroes in Slovene mythology. Then do tasks ONE and TWO.

KING MATJAŽ

The mountainous north of Slovenia, Slovenian Carinthia (Koroška), is a magical place that is also the legendary home of a sleeping king, whose awakening will one day bring prosperity to the land. This legendary and mythical king of Slovene people is known as Kralj Matjaž or King Matjaž. The figure of King Matjaž has been linked to a 15th century Hungarian king named Matthias Corvinus of Hungary, who was beloved by his people and holds a legendary status in Hungarian mythology, as well as that of Croatians and Serbs. However, the real life of Matthias Corvinus and the stories depicting King Matjaž hold very little resemblance. As a result, there are many different representations of King Matjaž and connections between him and other prominent figures in Slovene history, associating him with the Counts of Celje and even going as far as connecting him with a pagan Slavic god called Kersnik. The connection with Kersnik promotes the idea of the origin of the myth in the pre-Christian, pagan, time and mythology.

Due to the many theories explaining the origin of King Matjaž and the era in which the stories were formed, there is a multitude of tales about him that shine a light on various moments of his life. Regardless of the variation of the story, King Matjaž is always depicted as a king who is just and acts as a defender of his people, representing an age of prosperity. Most of these stories end with him and his warriors sleeping in a cave like dwelling, where they will stay until the need for protecting their people awakens them.

One of the most popular and well-known tales about King Matjaž in today's Slovene culture is that of King Matjaž and his wife Alenka (Kralj Matjaž and Alenčica).

It describes Matjaž as the ruler of Carinthia, a land where life was incredibly good. He was compassionate and generous, handing out gold coins to his subjects and helping them whenever they needed it. However, this prosperity did not last long, because the Turks began to invade the land from the east. One night, as King Matjaž was fighting the Turks, the sultan and his men attacked the king's castle where Matjaž's wife Alenka was sleeping, and abducted her. When Matjaž returned to the castle and found out what had happened, he and his men, the black army, rode until they found the Turkish camp and rescued Alenka





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from the tent of the sultan. However, while Matjaž was away from his kingdom, envious rulers forged a plan to defeat Matjaž and conquer his land. Luckily, Matjaž got wind of his enemies' plans and with his best soldiers, he attacked his enemies. They fought valiantly but the enemy was too strong, so Matjaž and his remaining soldiers had to flee toward the mountains. It was there that a miracle happened. As the king and his soldiers were stuck and the enemy closed in, mountain Peca opened up giving entry to Matjaž and his soldiers, allowing them to escape the enemy. Once they were safely inside, the mountain closed again. As it did, King Matjaž and his soldiers fell into a deep sleep. According to the legend, one day, when people of Slovenia will need him, the king and his soldiers will awaken from their slumber, bringing peace and prosperity back to their people.³

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One of the most well-known Slovene tales of these giants tells of a pagan girl known as Ajdovska deklica.

Ajdovska deklica is a legend about a girl (9) of the first giants. She was
believed to live under overhanging (10)and ledges of the Prisank mountain.
The girl helped travellers cross snowy mountain roads, and led them through snowstorms.
However, the girl was not only born of the first giants, she was also a Fate, so at night she
visited young mothers and foretold their children's future (11)
According to the legend, the girl once visited a new mother and her sleeping son in the Trenta
Valley. She leaned over the boy and said, "You will grow into a young man and become a
brave (12) unlike any before. You will hunt the white mountain goat with golden
horns called Zlatorog, and shoot him. His golden horns will make you incredibly
(13), however, he will be your downfall."
When the girl's pagan sisters heard of this (14), they cursed the girl for
foretelling the death of Zlatorog. Their curse turned the girl to stone.
To this day, you can see the (15) of this giant girl gazing sadly toward Trenta

TALES FROM SLOVENE MYTHOLOGY

Through the ages cultural crossings have given (0) <u>our</u> (we) people a diverse and rich cultural background. Just as the landscape in Slovenia is diverse, Slovenian tradition follows this diversity, creating a world of magic with every step.

ZLATOROG (THE GOLD HORNED MOUNTAIN GOAT)

ziatorog, the gold homed mountain goat, lived and reighed in the mountains surrounding
Triglav and his golden horns symbolised (1) (great) treasure known to men.
In the Trenta Valley, below the mountains, a young hunter (2) (fall) in love with
a beautiful maiden. He (3) (win) her heart by bringing her (4)
(beautiful) mountain flowers he could find. However, her affection was won over by a rich
merchant, who gave her jewels. The merchant taunted the young hunter, saying that if he truly
loved the girl, he would bring her the treasure of Zlatorog.

dragon. One of the most famous dragons in Slovenia is the Ljubljana dragon.



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The story of Ljubljana dragon is connected to the legend of Jason and the Argonauts. Jason
was a (10) (Greece) hero whose quest to steal the Golden Fleece led him
from the Black Sea all the way to the Ljubljanica River. On their ship, the Argo, they
(11) (reach) a large lake near the Ljubljanica, on the Ljubljana Marshes. As it

god known for his joyful nature, represents fertility and has the power to chase away winter

There are several variations of the tale about the Kurent and the great flood. In this tale, pagan
gods decided to punish the first (16) (person), because they became corrupt
and evil, therefore, they created a great flood. Only four (17) (man) survived
this terrible flood. Nothing is known about three of them, but it is well known how
(18) (four) one got away. According to the story, he grabbed a vine on a hill
and climbed it. The Kurent saw the man who (19) (hold) onto his sacred plant

fruits of the two plants dedicated to him – the grapevine and buckwheat. He roamed the world

PERKMANDELJC

Have you ever (0) <u>heard</u> of Bergmandeljc or Perkmandeljc?
(1) names are connected to the same mythical creature living deep underground all over Slovenia. This mythical creature is a goblin who lived in the mineshafts throughout Slovenia and liked (2) play pranks on miners who worked there. His mischievous behaviour mostly targeted the miners who cursed loudly during their hard work or acted in ways the goblin found disrespectful. He blew (3) their lamps, hid their tools or tied their shoes together in order to play tricks on them.
However, the goblin was not (4) mischievous, but also rewarded the hard-working miners who behaved according to his wishes. By knocking on walls and rocks within the mine, he led (5) to where they could find rich ore. Loud blows of the hammer warned the miners of imminent (6), so they had time to flee.
