

The Southeast Asian Games, also known as the SEA Games (SEAG), is a multi-sport event involving participants from the current 11 countries of Southeast Asia. The games are held every two years with the aim to help promote co-operation, understanding, and good relations among countries in the Southeast Asian region. The founding members were Myanmar, Cambodia, Laos, Malaysia, Thailand and the Republic of Vietnam.



The games were first held in Bangkok from 12–17 December 1959, with more than 527 athletes and officials from the six countries in 12 sports. The sports were aquatics, athletics, badminton, basketball, boxing, cycling, football, shooting, table tennis, tennis, volleyball and.

Over the years, other Southeast Asian countries were added into the games. In 1975, Brunei, Indonesia and the Philippines were included in the 8th SEAP Games. East Timor was admitted at the 22nd Southeast Asian Games in 2003 Hanoi–Ho Chi Minh City.

The 2009 Southeast Asian Games was the first time Laos has ever hosted a Southeast Asian Games. Running from 9th–18th December, it has also commemorated the 50 years of the Southeast Asian Games, held in Vientiane, Laos.

In the 30th edition of the Games in 2019, 56 different sports were contested – the most in the history of SEA Games.
