Past Perfect Tense indicates a past action which is completed before another past action.

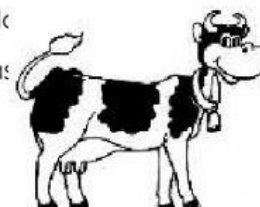
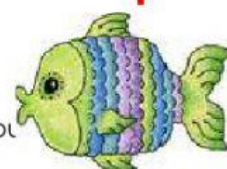

- If you mix yellow and blue, you get green.
- If you are tired, you go to bed early.
- If you leave the object, it drops.
- If you pour oil on water, it floats.
- If you smoke, you get old early.
- If you leave the object, it drops.

First Conditional

Structure **IF + Simple Present, Simple Future**

(S + will/won't + V(bare form))

Usage To talk about possibilities in the present or in the future

- Examples
- If it **rains**, I **will stay** at home.
 - If I **wake** up late, I **will miss** the bus.
 - And, if it's sunny, we'll **go** to the park.
 - If Juan **leaves**, Paula **will be** sad.
 - If I **find** your email, I **will send** you the picture.
 - If you **study** hard, you **will pass** your exams.
