### THE FIRST TRAVELLERS

The first real travellers to the Ancient World were the Phoenicians, people who had settled on a coastal strip of land at the eastern side of the Mediterranean. Their wealth originally came from a dye made from a small shellfish found on their shores. When finally, the 30 \_\_\_\_\_ of this shellfish fell, the Phoenicians were forced to search for other 31 \_\_\_\_\_ of wealth.

Their courageous seamen took their galleys into the Red Sea.

The Greek historian Herodotus tells in his "History" of an expedition made by the Phoenicians at the orders of an Egyptian pharaoh. He mentions its importance but 32 \_\_\_\_\_ to give the names of any of those who took part.

About a century later another expedition set 33 \_\_\_\_\_ under a Phoenician called Hanno, and one of its members wrote an exciting account of their adventures.

Hanno sailed from his home in Carthage as the leader of the fleet of nearly 70 galleys. The aim of the expedition was to set 34 \_\_\_\_\_ new colonies along the west coast of Africa.

A number of colonies were formed, but often attempts to land on the African coast were unsuccessful, for the would-be settlers were met by "wild men, clad in the skins of beasts who cast stones and drove us off, 35 \_\_\_\_\_ us from landing".

The Phoenicians sailed on, recording many strange sights. They ran 36 \_\_\_\_\_ of supplies as Hanno's fleet neared the Equator and he was forced to turn round and head for home.
