(or)

2. Arman plays football.
Arman plays *sepak takraw*. (and)

3. Raju wants to go to school.
Raju has a fever. (but)

4. Noreen does not eat pineapples.
Noreen does not eat any other fruit. (nor)

5. Parrots are good pets.
Parrots are cute and entertaining. (for)

6. Thila did not want to go to the doctor's.
Thila went anyway. (yet)

7. It was going to rain.
She took an umbrella with her. (so)

8. Boon Leong was tired.
Boon Leong had a headache. (and)

9. The cat drank some water. It was thirsty. (for)

10. Pritam is on a diet. Pritam wants to eat ice cream. (yet)



Get It Right

1. A simple sentence has **one subject and one predicate**.

2. It shows **one thought or an idea**.

Examples:

Aishah is in the library.

I have two brothers.

3. A compound sentence has **two or more simple sentences joined by a conjunction (and, but, or, nor, so, yet, for)**.

Examples:

My father was tired **so** he went to bed early.

I like pizza **but** I do not like spaghetti.

We can visit the museum **or** the zoo next week.

My uncle does not smoke **nor** drink.

She was late for school **for** she missed the bus.
