3 Past Simple and Past Continuous

Past simple tense is used to talk about activities done in the past and habits. Past continuous tense is used to describe an unfinished action in the past or ongoing action that began in the past.

1. Simple past tense

Past simple is formed by adding '-d, -ed, -ied' to the verbs depending on the verbs form.

2. Past continuous tense

Singular subject and pronoun 'I' use 'was' + verb + ing. Plural subject and pronoun 'You' use 'were' + verb + ing.

3. Irregular verb change completely or slightly but unchanged verb does not change at all.

4. Add 'not' after verbs to make negative sentence. For affirmative sentence, do not use 'not'.

Examples:

- (a) hope - hoped (regular + d)
 (b) walk - walked (regular + ed)
 (c) cry - cried (regular + ied)

- (a) I was eating that cookie.
 (b) She was practising violin.
 (c) Fuad and I were fishing last night.
 (d) We were laughing at the new comedy show.

- (a) draw - drew / go - went / see - saw (irregular)
 (b) put, read, hurt, quit, let, shut (unchanged)

- (a) He did not read the note. (simple)
 (b) We were not studying enough. (continuous)
