Some:

- There are **some** tomatoes in the fridge.
- There is **some** cheese in the fridge.
- Would you like **some** coffee?
- Would you like **some** water?

Any

- There aren't **any** tomatoes for the recipe.
- There isn't **any** cheese left.
- Are there **any** tomatoes?
- Is there **any** cheese left?

Much

- There isn't **much** time left! Hurry up, please!
- How **much** time do we have left?



### Many

- There aren't **many** people here today.
- How **many** people are there in the classroom today?

### A lot of/lots of

- There are **a lot of** tomatoes in the fridge.
- There is **a lot of** milk in this bottle.
- There aren't **a lot of** oranges to make the cake.
- There isn't **a lot of** cheese left. We will have to buy more for the lasagna.
- Have you got **a lot of** free time?
- Have you got **a lot of** friends?

### A few

I have **a few** friends.

### A little

There is **a little** water left in the bottle. I think I am going to save it for the end of the class.

### Too much

There is **too much** pollution in the cities nowadays, which is causing people's life expectancy to reduce as a consequence of premature death associated with breathing complications.

### Too many

There are always **too many** cars on the road during rush hour and that's the reason I prefer not to drive during these times. Traffic drives me crazy!!!



### Enough

There are **enough** chairs for all the guests to sit down.

### Not enough

There aren't **enough** chairs for everybody to sit. We will have to improvise some seats for everybody to be comfortable during the celebration.
