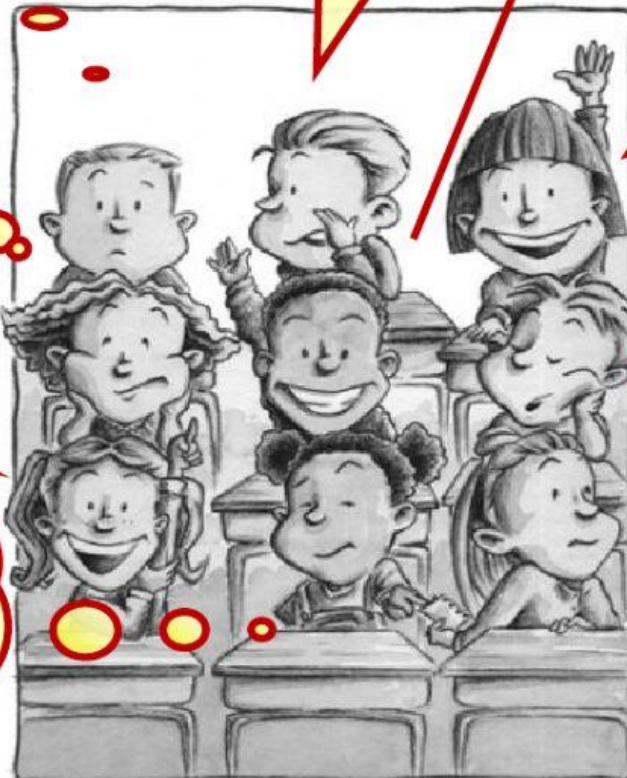
This is a multi-mood classroom! Read the sentences and learn about modals!

Modal verbs may express different things, and their meaning vary according to the context of the sentence. They have no full meaning like the other verbs, and so they are also called **modal auxiliary verbs**. Below, in the boxes, you will find their uses.

Modal verbs have no *-s* on the third person singular; they do not need auxiliary *do* in the negative and interrogative and after a modal verb there is always another verb in the *infinitive without to* (except *ought to*).

- ability or capacity (past)

- prohibition (with *not*)

MIGHT

- past tense of may
- polite request
- remote possibility

- moral obligation or desirability

- habitual action in the past
