

## A century of change

Since (0) *the* beginning of the last century there have been enormous changes in the way (1) \_\_\_ people live. (2) \_\_\_ world has become a much smaller place and (3) \_\_\_ life is much faster.

In (4) \_\_\_ first half of the twentieth century, (5) \_\_\_ horse was gradually replaced by (6) \_\_\_ motor car as (7) \_\_\_ most popular form of transport. (8) \_\_\_ hundred years ago, (9) \_\_\_ air travel was in its infancy; now there are over 90 000 commercial flights (10) \_\_\_ day worldwide. In the 1940s, (11) \_\_\_ steam trains were still a common sight on the world's railways. They have now all but disappeared from mainline routes and in several countries electric-powered high-speed trains can be seen racing across (12) \_\_\_ countryside at around 300 kilometres (13) \_\_\_ hour.

And (14) \_\_\_ information travels faster, too, thanks to developments in information technology, telecommunications and mass media. Having your own computer at (15) \_\_\_ home was almost unheard of in 1970, but just 40 years later in 2010 there were well over (16) \_\_\_ billion personal computers in use worldwide. Invented in 1876, (17) \_\_\_ telephone was already fairly widely in use by 1910, with some seven million installed in (18) \_\_\_ United States alone. But who could have predicted that a century later an estimated 70 per cent of the world's population would own (19) \_\_\_ mobile phone? Commercial television did not really take off until just after (20) \_\_\_ Second World War – and we all know how successful that phenomenon has been!
