

CLASSIFICATION OR CLASSIFY

When you classify things, you put them into groups that are related or have something in common.

Below is a picture of all school supply items, so they all belong in one group.



Examples:

<p>The items that are circled are balls. The item in the middle is a food item. The balls belong in the same group.</p>	<p><i>Things that belong together</i></p> A row of three items. The first and third items are soccer balls, each with a red and white or black and white pattern and a blue circle around it. The middle item is a green lime.
<p>The items that are circled are dinosaurs. The item not circled is a bow which is not an animal. The dinosaurs belong to the same group.</p>	A row of three items. The first item is a red ribbon bow. The next two items are dinosaurs: a brown triceratops with a blue circle around it, and a green long-necked dinosaur (brontosaurus) with a blue circle around it.
<p>The items that are circled are butterflies. The item not circled is a bird. The butterflies belong in the same group.</p>	A row of three items. The first two items are butterflies: a red one with a blue circle around it, and a red and orange one with a blue circle around it. The third item is a yellow bird with orange wings.
<p>The animals circled live in the water. The item in the middle is an animal that lives on land. The ocean animals belong in the same group.</p>	A row of three items. The first item is a red crab with a blue circle around it. The middle item is a brown lion. The third item is a colorful fish (orange, yellow, and blue) with a blue circle around it.
