

Remember and Remind

- If you **remember** a fact or something from the past, you keep it in your mind, or bring it back into your mind.
 - When you **remind** someone to do something, you make them remember it.
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We use **hear** for sounds that come to our ears, without us necessarily trying to hear them! For example, 'They heard a strange noise in the middle of the night.'

Listen is used to describe paying attention to sounds that are going on. For example, 'Last night, I listened to my new Mariah Carey CD.'

JOB - a task (countable) - *I can't do two jobs at once*

WORK - an activity (uncountable) - *When will the work on your kitchen be finished?*
