I / You / He / She / It / We / They

I'd like a melon.

We'd like some pasta.

Would you like some cereal?

Yes, please. No, thanks.

Would you like a banana?



We'd like an ice cream!

I'd like = I would like

Remember:

Pronouns - I / You / He / She / It / We / They

Would - 'd (short form)

Countable nouns refer to things that can be counted. They have singular and plural forms. We use a/an for singular and we may use some for plural.

Example:

an apple, some apples;

a melon, some melons

Countable nouns become plural by adding **-s** or **-es** at the end of the word with some exceptions.

Example:

orange, oranges; melon, melons;

potato, potatoes; pen, pens

Uncountable nouns refer to things that cannot be counted. They have a singular form and do not have a plural form - you can't add an **-s** to it.

Example:

some sugar, much dirt;
some milk, a little bit of pepper

Write **a** before the consonant sound (b,c,d,f,g,,k,l,m,n,p,q,r,s,t,v,w,x,y,z)

Write **an** before the vowel sound (a,e,I,o,u)

There is **a** banana.

Singular (only 1)
countable

I have **an** egg.

There are **some** apples.

Plural (more than 1)
countable

I have **some** eggs.

There is **some** salt.

Uncountable
Singular ✓
No plural ✗

He has **some** bread.
