

Can, Can't, Could, Couldn't

Use **can** or **can't** to talk about someone's **ability now** or **ability in the future**.

Example: Mary can't swim. (now)

Maybe next month, she can go back to school. (in a future month)

Use **could** or **couldn't** to talk about someone's **ability in the past**.

Example: I could fit in that dress when I was 20 years old. (at a past time)

He didn't have enough money and he couldn't go on vacation last year. (a past year)

To be able to / To not be able to

Use **am, is, are, was, were, or will be able to** for someone's **ability at any time** → **in the past, in the present or in the future.**

Example: Mary wasn't able to swim. (in the past)

Now she is able to swim, but her son isn't able to swim. (now)

When they move, their sons will be able to have separate rooms (in the future)

[NOTE: Adverbs like *never, sometimes, soon* come after the first verb or modal.]
