Can, Can't, Could, Couldn't

Use can or can't to talk about someone's ability now or ability in the future.

Example: Mary <u>can't</u> swim.(<u>now</u>)

Maybe <u>next month</u>, she <u>can</u> go back to school.(<u>in a future month</u>)

Use could or couldn't to talk about someone's ability in the past.

Example: I <u>could</u> fit in that dress when I <u>was</u> 20 years old.(at a past time)

He didn't have enough money and he <u>couldn't</u> go on vacation <u>last year</u>.(a past year)

Instructions: Use **can**, **can't**, **could**, or **couldn't** to finish these sentences.

Now she <u>is able to</u> <u>swim, but her son isn't able to</u> <u>swim. (now)</u>
When they move, their sons <u>will be able to</u> have separate rooms (in the <u>future</u>)

[NOTE: Adverbs like never, sometimes, soon come after the first verb or modal.]
