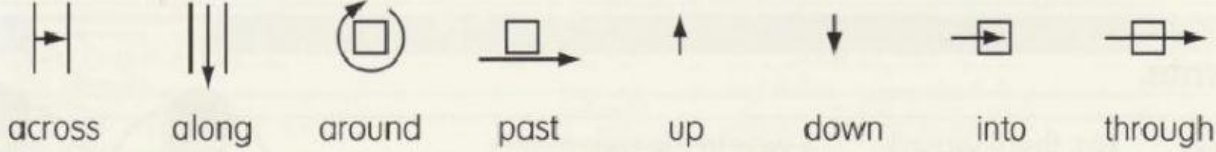


Prepositions of movement

We use **prepositions of movement** to say how people or things are moving.



Ex.1. Choose

Tom and Maria walk to school every day. Tom leaves his house and he walks (1) along the road. He goes (2) past the railway station and (3) across the bridge. He goes (4) through the park and then he is at school.

Maria leaves her house and she walks (5) along the road. She goes (6) across the supermarket and (7) around the river. She goes (8) into the castle and then she is at school.
