

We use *must* and *have to* to talk about rules, to tell someone to do something, or when something is necessary.

You must be 15 to watch that film.

I must buy those new school books.

We have to do our homework tonight.

Do you have to practise the piano now?

We use *mustn't* to tell someone not to do something.

You mustn't play music in the library.

We use *don't / doesn't have to* when something isn't necessary.

At my school, students don't have to stand up when teachers come in.
