

MODAL VERBS

MODAL VERB	USAGE	EXAMPLE
SHOULD / SHOULDN'T (advise/ recommendation)	To give an advice or recommendation .	- You should study more. - You shouldn't drive so fast.
CAN / CAN'T (ability / inability)	To express ability (can) and inability (can't) to do something in the present or future.	- She can speak three languages. - She can't speak Chinese.
COULD (ability in past)	To express general ability in the past .	- I could play tennis when I was younger. - She could speak fluent French when she was 5.
MUST (obligation)	To express obligation .	- Students must wear uniform. - You must use a mask if you go out.
MUSN'T (prohibition)	To express prohibition .	- You mustn't swim in this river. - You mustn't speak loud in the library.

Should / Shouldn't : Recomendaciones
(Deberías/ no deberías)

Can/ can't: habilidades
(poder/ no poder hacer algo)

Could: habilidades en el pasado
(pudo/pude)

Must: obligaciones
(tienes que...)

Musn't: prohibiciones
(no tienes que hacerlo)
