

Mastering the possessive apostrophe requires only.... **One simple rule!**

The apostrophe is an arrow, pointing at who is doing the owning.

The **dog's bowl** was empty.

Who does the bowl belong to? The DOG. So, the arrow, or apostrophe, points to "dog" and add an S.

This rule even works for plural nouns. Check out these examples:

The **women's purses** all got swiped by the thief.

All of the **kids' balloons** all got swept away by the wind.

Who did the purses and balloons belong to? The WOMEN and KIDS. If the plural noun already ends in S just add the apostrophe.

SIMILE	METAPHOR
A simile compares two things, which have something in common. We use words such as 'as' or 'like' to make the comparison. For examples: 1) The children ran like the wind. 2) The girl was as good as a gold.	A metaphor describes something as it is actually something else. Unlike simile, a metaphor compares things indirectly. We use words other than 'as' and 'like'. Commonly, we use 'is', 'are', 'was', and 'were.' For examples: 1) You are the sunshine of my life. 2) I froze with fear.
