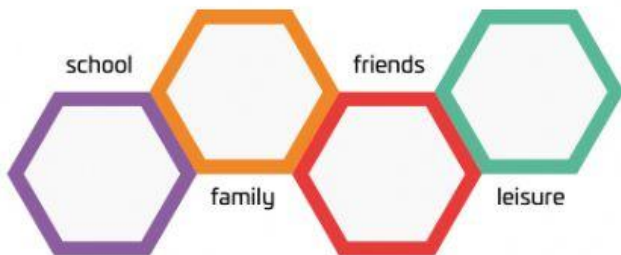
Is It Really Beneficial to Think Twice?

Well-made Decisions

Imagine you are walking on your way to school and you see a really cool game in a store window. You want to buy it, but you only have your lunch money for the rest of the week. Should you buy it or not? What would happen if you spent all your lunch money on it?

Whenever you are confronted with a decision, you should never make it lightly. You should always **take into account** all the options you have before doing so.

Always think twice about the decision you are going to make. There are always options. For example: if the person spends the lunch money on the game, he or she wouldn't eat lunch for the rest of the week. **On the contrary**, if the person analyzes the options he or she has they might make a smarter decision: earn the money by doing **chores**, or waiting for a birthday to get it as a gift.

If you **think** about your decisions twice, you won't **regret** it!
