Passive voice - Impersonal report structures

Special Passive Structures such as It is believed that.../ It is agreed to... He is said to.../She is thought to... are used when we cannot say or do not need to say who the source of information was.

This type of sentence structure is formal and is mainly used in written English.

- There are some verbs that can have two constructions in Passive Voice:
 - 1) Impersonal construction and 2) Personal construction.
- These verbs are:

Accept/ admit/ agree/ allege/ announce/ assure/ assume/ believe/ claim/ consider/ comment/ decide/ declare/ discover/ estimate/ expect/ explain/find/ know/ mention/ predict/ suggest/ realize/ report/ say/ recommend/ show/state/ suppose/ suggest/think/ understand

1) Impersonal Construction: (no person - with it)

It + verb in passive (present or past) + that + clause

Examples:

- ✓ People say that she is a millionaire. ⇒ It is said that she is a millionaire.
- ✓ People believe that the President will resign. ⇒ It is believed that the President will resign.
- ✓ They don't believe his health is terrible.

 ⇒ It is not believed that his health is very terrible.
- ✓ They thought he was responsible.

 ⇒ It was thought that he was responsible.

2) Personal Construction: (person / subject)

Subject + verb in passive (present or past) + full infinitive form

Examples:

- They believe his health is terrible.

 His health is believed to be terrible.
- They say that she isn't a millionaire.

 She isn't said to be a millionaire.

 □ She isn't s
- Someone reported that the actor suffered an overdose.
 □ The actor was reported to suffer an overdose.

Note: With these structures the agent of the action is NEVER mentioned (who believes/ who reports/ who knows/ ...)

It + passive verb + that -clause Subject + passive verb + to-infinitive People rumour that Angelina Jolie has anorexia It is rumoured that Angelina Jolie has anorexia. Angelina Jolie is rumoured to have anorexia

The tense of the passive verb is determined by the active sentence:



Passive Gerund = being + past participle
I don't appreciate people lying to me.
I don't appreciate being lied to.

Passive Infinitive = to + be + past part
