Well known Jamaican, Robert Nesta Marley, singer, songwriter, guitarist and most widely known performer of reggae music rose from depressed circumstances to become an international superstar.

Bob Marley as he was affectionately known was born on February 6th 1945 to a black teenage mother Cedalla Booker and a white father, Captain Norval Marley.

From his early years, he had a love for music. He and his childhood friend, Neville "Bunny" O' Riley Livingston, were of like minds and spent countless hours perfecting their musical abilities. Bob Marley who also joined the Rastafarian Movement was one of the founding members of the group called 'The Wailers'. He had his international breakthrough in 1975 with his hit song 'No Woman, No Cry'.

The late Bob Marley is a symbol of what passion and commitment can achieve, he struggled against the odds of his poverty-stricken environment and constant bullying by his peers to become an icon of reggae music. He will forever be remembered for such songs as 'I shot the Sheriff', 'Redemption Song', and 'One Love' among others.

In spite of the fact that he died of cancer on May 11th 1981 in a Miami Hospital, this musical genius remains enormously popular and well-known throughout the world. His music has grown in popularity in the years since his death.
