## ASSIGNMENT:

Write an essay evaluating the following Editorial from an objective perspective.

- Remember that editorial writing is a style of writing in which the author provides an opinion on a topical issue.
- Especially in today's world, publishing an editorial has become easier and easier.
  While established news agencies have people whom they have hired to check
  facts, evaluate sources, and ensure that what gets published is accurate, there are
  still instances where what gets published is not necessarily credible, viable, or
  truthful.
- To be a skillful, informed reader, you need to learn to evaluate sources (such as editorials) from a variety of perspectives. Asking questions about ALL of the following will make you a better critical reader:
  - The author's background/qualifications to write/speak about a topic
    - o Are they an expert on the topic?
    - o Do they have professional training/experience with their topic?
  - The relevancy and/or currency of the facts they have used to support their opinion
    - o Are they using the MOST recent facts/data to support their opinion?
  - · The author's purpose for publishing the editorial piece
    - o Is it to persuade, inform, entertain, sell, etc.?
  - . The publishing source for the editorial
    - Are they a private company with a political or social agenda?
    - o Is the editorial heavily sponsored with advertisements?
  - · The quality of the information presented
    - o Are there errors and/or typographical errors in the editorial?
  - Whether or not the author offers perspective on the counterclaim
    - o Is there information about a perspective that opposes their own?
