She could not find a school like that, so she decided to found one!

B. ---

There is a challenging curriculum in this extraordinary school. It's known as "changemaker curriculum". This type of curriculum aims to create a student profile that is able to take the responsibility of their own learning through a combination of real-world exploration, skills mastery and project-based learning. Thanks to these three, the students have the opportunity to practise different values from all over the world. For example, students learn about Greek *meraki*. This means being able to put their soul, creativity and love into their work. They learn discipline and responsibility thanks to Japanese *kaizen*. They learn to connect themselves to a greater group

from Zulu *ubuntu*. Isn't it interesting and exciting to be a student at Think Global School?

C. ---

The curriculum supports students to have different perspectives with the help of different values. Students apply these values to their lives. Students travel to 12 countries in three years. There are two big groups of students. They are called Changemaker Cohort 1 (CM1) and Changemaker Cohort 2 (CM2). They are separate during travels but united in learning. Each cohort visits four countries each year for eight weeks. They travel the same cities but at different times. Then, they have a five-week break. During the break, they rest and reconnect with their families and friends.

D. ---

Actually, there is not a typical day at this school. Students never have a timetable that tells them what to do when. No two days are quite the same! One day, students start the day with traditional pastries from a neighbourhood bakery in the garden, and the other day they may be the chef in the kitchen!
