



in case To talk about something that might possibly happen	
= in case + present	<i>I'm going to leave early in case it takes a long time to get there.</i> <i>Take my number in case you need to phone me later on.</i>
= in case + any tense	<i>I took a sandwich in case I got hungry on the journey</i> <i>In case you haven't heard the news, I'll tell you.</i>

as long as I provided (that) /providing (that) to talk about something that must happen or be true in order for the other part of the sentence to happen or be true	
= as long as / provided / providing + present tense	<i>As long as you leave before 3, you'll catch the plane.</i> <i>I'll go back to work tomorrow provided (that) I'm feeling better.</i>
= as long as I provided /I providing + any tense	<i>He told me I could stay as long as I was quiet.</i> <i>Providing that you've followed my instructions, everything will be fine.</i>

even if to talk about a possibility which does not affect or make any difference to what is stated in the other part of the sentence	
= even if + conditional pattern	<i>Even if she apologizes, I won't forgive her.</i> <i>Even if I'd tried hard, I would have failed.</i> <i>Even if I'd done what you suggested, I'd be in the same position now.</i>
= even if + any tense	<i>Even if you speak the language, it isn't easy to make friends here.</i>

use **even if** with any appropriate verb tense to talk about the consequences of possible facts

- Write my address down because you might want to contact me. (**case**)
Write my address down to contact me.
- I'll lend you the money but you must give it back to me next week, (**long**)
I'll lend you the money it back to me next week
- You can ask me a thousand times but I'll never agree, (**even**)
I'll never agree me a thousand times.
- If you don't work hard, you won't get anywhere in life, (**unless**)
You won't get anywhere in life hard.
- To catch that tram we must leave now. (**providing**)
We'll catch that train now.
- He hasn't got a lot of money but he'd be unhappy anyway, (**even**)
He'd be unhappy a lot of money.
- I'll be polite to him but he must be polite to me. (**provided**)
I'll be polite to him polite to me.
- If she doesn't get promoted soon, she'll leave the company, (**unless**)
She'll leave the company soon.
- Let's talk about this now because we might not have an opportunity later, (**case**)
Let's talk about this now an opportunity later.
- I didn't run all the way there but I would have been late anyway, (**even**)
I would have been late all the way there.



Not real=past tenses

wish	wanting a situation or fact to be different
= subject + wish + second subject + past simple/ past continuous	<i>He wishes he was younger. I wish it wasn't raining.</i>
= subject + wish + second subject + would (future)	<i>I wish she would phone me. I wish you wouldn't keep arguing with me. I wish you would stop arguing with me.</i>
= subject + wish + second subject + could	<i>I wish I could play the piano. They wish they could have a holiday.</i>
= subject + wish + second subject + past continuous	<i>I wish I wasn't working tomorrow. She wishes he wasn't leaving next week.</i>
= subject + wish + second subject + past perfect(regret)	<i>I wish I hadn't agreed to help them. I wish I'd taken your advice.</i>

if only	the same idea as wish and use in the same patterns emphatic sentences and expresses a very strong desire
if only + subject + past simple	<i>If only I was younger</i>
if only + subject + past continuous	<i>If only it wasn't raining, we could go out.</i>
if only + subject + would	<i>If only she'd phone me, I'd stop worrying.</i>
if only + subject + could	<i>If only I could play the piano like that!</i>
if only + subject + past continuous	<i>If only I wasn't working tomorrow, I could take it easy.</i>
if only + subject + past perfect	<i>If only I hadn't agreed to help them!</i>

if only can be used in exclamations or in conditional sentences

regret	to talk about feeling that something someone did or didn't do in the past was a bad idea
regret + (not) + -ing	<i>I regretted being rude to her. I regret not taking that opportunity.</i>
regret + infinitive with to	<i>We regret to inform you that your application has been unsuccessful.</i>

Past Simple improbable situations in the present.	can be used to talk about imaginary, unreal or
Conditionals Type 2	<i>If I were you, I wouldn't do that. *</i>
wish (present)	<i>I wish she were more cooperative. *</i>
I'd rather/sooner sb ... (present)	<i>I'd rather you paid me today. I'd rather go than stay here. I'd rather you went.</i>
Suppose/Supposing	<i>Suppose your father caught you smoking, what would you do?</i>
as if/as though (untrue situation in the present)	<i>She behaves as if she were the Queen.</i>
it's (about/high) time ...	<i>It's time you started work. It is time for you to start work</i>

Past Perfect improbable situations in the past.	can be used to talk about imaginary, unreal or
Conditionals Type 3 (unreal in the past)	<i>If he had warned me, this wouldn't have happened.</i>
wish (past)	<i>If only I hadn't lost all my money last night.</i>
I'd rather/sooner sb ... (past)	<i>I'd rather you had not told everyone.</i>
Suppose/Supposing	<i>Suppose he had left before the boss came, what would have happened?</i>
as if/as though (untrue situation in the past)	<i>Soon after being introduced, they were talking to each other as if they had been friends for years.</i>
