Good Luck Charms

A good luck charm is something believed to bring good luck. Through the ages, people have carried objects to bring good fortune and protect them from danger. Even those who are not superstitious will wear a good luck symbol. Here are some objects that people believe might bring good luck.



Elephant

Ganesha is the Hindu god of luck. He is recognized by his elephant head. In Chinese feng shui, the elephant is a symbol of good luck, strength, and protection. A number of Asian cultures believe that the elephant is a cosmic creature and carries the world upon its back. The elephant has also made its way into Western cultures as a good luck charm.

Crickets

These insects are considered good luck. In China and other Asian countries, the cricket served as a warning: at any sign of danger, the cricket would stop chirping. Native Americans believed the cricket brought good luck. In ancient cultures in the Middle East and Europe, images of crickets appear on charms and amulets.

Ladybugs



The ladybug is considered an indication of good luck. If you wear a ladybug amulet, or if one lands on you, it will brighten your day and lessen your problems. If one lands on you when you are ill, it will take the illness away.

Four-Leaf Clover



In Ireland, four-leaf clovers are a symbol of good luck. As the old Irish verse says:

*One leaf is for fame,
And one leaf is for wealth,
And one is for a faithful lover,
And one is to bring you glorious health,
Are all in the four-leaf clover.*

People look for them in the grass, and they won't resist picking a four-leaf clover and carrying it with them for luck and all the good things that it might bring.

Wishbone

The wishbone, a bone from the breast of a chicken, is a symbol of good luck. It is also a wish maker. Two people tug on the wishbone, each making a wish. After the bone breaks, the person with the bigger piece will have their wish granted.

Acorns



In Scandinavian folklore, the acorn, fruit of the oak tree, will bring good fortune to the bearer. An acorn placed on a windowsill of the house will protect it from lightning.



Horseshoe

The horseshoe is supposed to bring good fortune when hung on the wall of a home or doorway. The "U" shape will hold good luck inside forever.

Rainbow

If you want to get rich, follow a rainbow, and if you're lucky, you'll find a pot full of gold at the end. At least, that's what could happen according in folk belief.
