Main and Helping Verbs

Verbs that are made up of more than one word are **verb phrases**. In a verb phrase, the **main verb** names the action. The **helping verb** helps tell the time of the action. Some common helping verbs are has, have, had, am, is, are, was, were, do, does, did, can, could, will, would, and should.

- The main verb is always the last word in a verb phrase. (The horse is looking at me.)
- There may be more than one helping verb in a verb phrase. (She <u>has been riding</u> horses a long time.)
- Helping verbs such as is and are show that action is happening in the present. (Annamae is reading
 about the Navajo.) Was and were tell that the action happened in the past. (The class was reading
 about the Navajo last month.) Will tells that the action is going to happen in the future. (We will
 study the Anasazi next week.)
