Why Rainforests Matter?

Rainforests are important because they offer homes to trees, other plants, animals, and local people – but they also play a big role in keeping the Earth's climate and our weather as we know it. Over 80 countries in the tropics (where the sun is hottest) have rainforests.

Plants and animals make up the rainforest. They are home to half the world's known plants and animals. There are 5 layers.

- 1.The emergent layer at treetop height.
- 2.The canopy layer where the leaves form a 'ceiling'.
- 3.The understorey layer that is dark and humid.
- 4.The shrub layer.
- 5.The forest floor.

Rainforests give us crops and medicines, like rice and potatoes, nuts, spices, coffee and chocolate.

Rainforests stop flooding and provide rain. The trees soak up tropical rainfall and then slowly release the water into the air to form rainclouds. These clouds are then carried by the winds to other countries where they 'feed' the crops. The trees also remove carbon dioxide, a global warming gas. They store the carbon in their trunks and release the oxygen that we breathe.
