

Multiplication practice:

$$2 \times 2 \times 5 = \underline{\hspace{2cm}}$$

$$5 \times 4 \times 2 = \underline{\hspace{2cm}}$$

$$9 \times 3 \times 2 = \underline{\hspace{2cm}}$$

Example:

$$16 \times 4 =$$
$$(10+6)$$

$$10 \times 4 = 40$$

$$6 \times 4 = 24$$

So the answer is $40 + 24 = 64$

$$16 \times 5 =$$

$$(10+6)$$
