

# Opposites

Work with a partner. Partner [A] reads the sentence out loud. Partner [B] changes the adverb to its opposite adverb and says the sentence again.

## Example

[Partner A]

He always leaves so **angrily**.



NOTE: Don't forget to use capital letters

[Partner B]

He always leaves so **happily**.

[1] Please you shouldn't eat so **fast**. → Please you shouldn't eat so **slowly**.

[2] Oh my god, you sing so badly.

[3] Don't eat so nosily.

[4] Don't hit that so hard.

[5] You drive so carefully.

[6] They finished so quickly.

[7] Your brother acts so politely.

[8] And they lived happily ever after.

[9] I was walking slowly when I fell down the stairs.

[10] My brother dances so well.

[11] That piece of the puzzle fits nicely right here.

[12] The dog eats so quietly.

[13] Why do you kick the ball so softly?

[14] Our Bus driver drives carelessly.

[15] You behave very rudely when I see you nowadays.

[16] My dad always listens to his music loudly.
