WOLVES ESCAPE FROM ESSEX ZOO

Three wolves have been shot dead after the captive animals broke a fence and escaped from Colchester Zoo in Essex. The wolves (0) _____ by zookeepers during an eight-hour hunt involving armed police officers and a helicopter.

The search for the animals (17) _____ on Tuesday when zookeepers found that five of the six wolves at the zoo had escaped through a damaged zoo fence. One of the wolves (18) _____ and another was captured after it had been shot with an anaesthetic dart. The other three wolves (19) _____ the area of the zoo. Essex police sent a helicopter and armed officers to the scene. Police (20) _____ to stay away from the area even though zoo officials said that the wolves (21) _____ anybody unless cornered.

The hunt ended shortly after 4pm when the final missing wolf (22) _____ hiding in bushes. The animal was shot dead. A Colchester Zoo spokeswoman said the zookeepers (23) _____ by the death of the wolves and that a full report on the matter (24) _____.
