

# Adverbs That Compare

Adverbs tell when, where, or how something happened. They can also be used to compare actions. Add the ending *-er* to adverbs to compare two actions. When the adverb ends in *-ly* place the word *more* or *most* in front of the adverb. To compare more than two actions, add the ending *-est*.

Adverb	Comparing Two Actions	Comparing More Than Two Actions
fast	faster	fastest
quickly	more quickly	most quickly

Kyle ran fast. Cassie ran faster than Kyle. Rosa ran the fastest of all.
