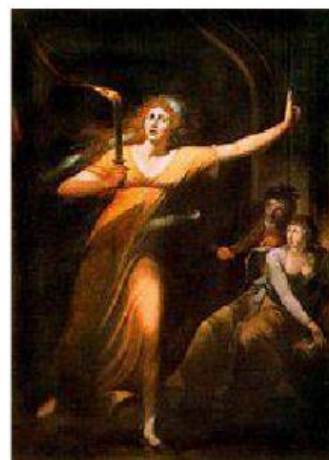


# Macbeth: Act 4
