Relative Clauses

Relative clauses are used to give more information about a person or a thing. They join two ideas together.

Relative clauses can be joined to the main clause using **who, which** or **that.**

We use which or that when we are talking about things.

Example: This is my computer. I use it to study.

This is my computer which I use to study.

We use **who** or **that** when we are talking about things.

Example: Mr. Bean is a man. He is very funny.

Mr. Bean is a man who is very funny.
