

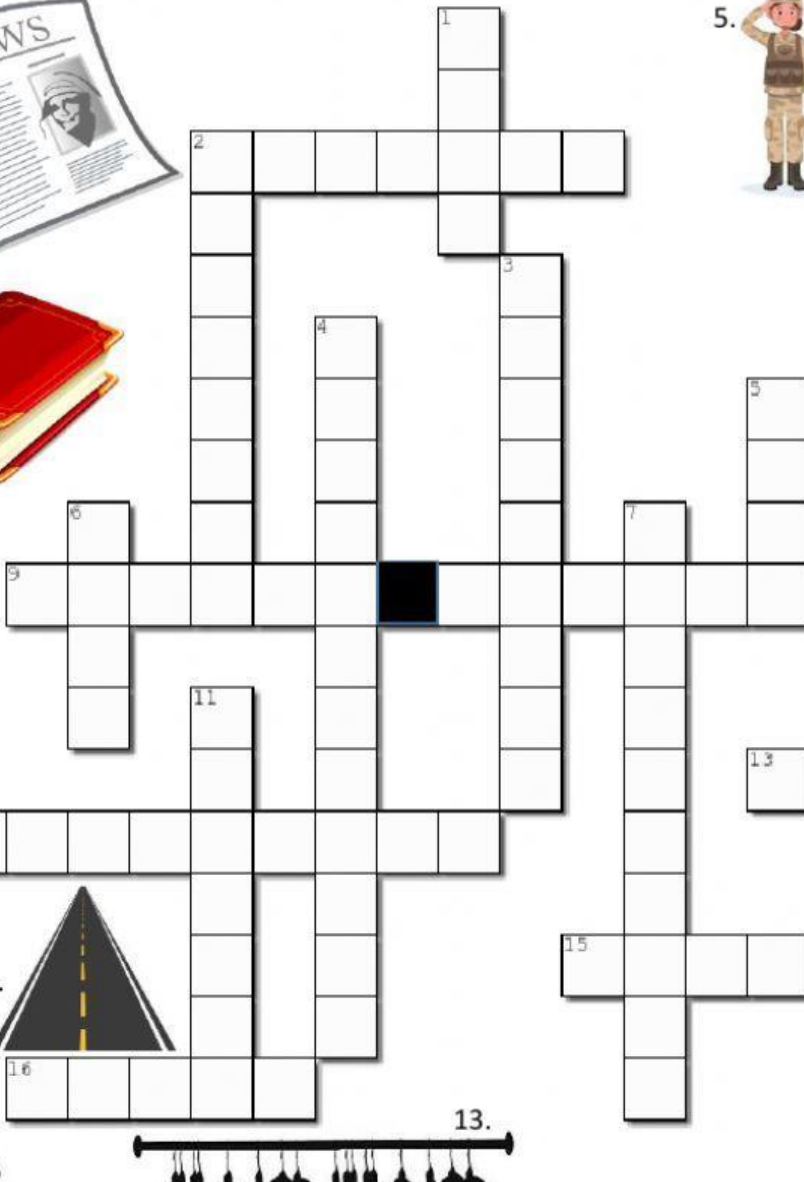

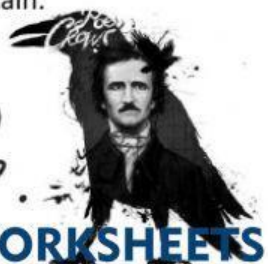

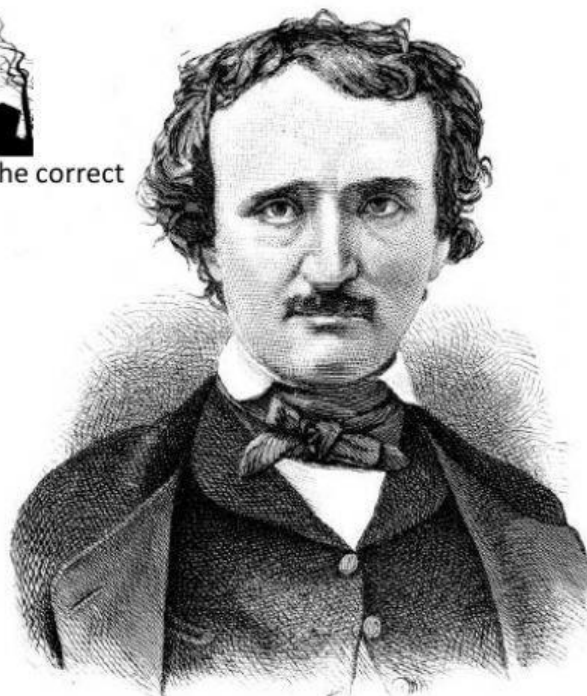

Poe born in Boston. His father abandoned the family in 1810, and when his mother died the following year, Poe taken into the home of John Allan, a successful in Richmond (Virginia). The Allans served as a and gave him the name "Edgar Allan Poe", though they never formally adopted him.

The family sailed to the United Kingdom in 1815 where Poe attended the grammar school. He moved with the Allans back to Richmond in 1820. In 1824, he served as the of the Richmond youth honor guard.

In February 1826, the young Edgar registered at the University of Virginia to study ancient and modern languages.

He lost touch with his family and girlfriend while his debts increasing. He gave up on the university after a year losing money and his girlfriend who had married another man. He worked as a and writer. He travelled to Boston in April 1827.

As the young Edgar unable to support himself, he enlisted in the on May 27, 1827. That same year, he released his first

Edgar did not get on well with John Allan, so he travelled to Baltimore in March 1831 to live with his aunt, brother and cousin.

Poe started his career as a writer in a difficult time for American publishing. However, he focused on writing but he never left his first love: poetry. In October 1833, he received his first

Edgar married his cousin Virginia on September 22, 1835. He 26 and she 13. One evening in January 1842, Virginia showed the first signs of and Poe began to drink more heavily under the stress of her illness.

She died on January 30, 1847. Poe increasingly unstable after his wife's death.

Poe published several poems, stories, articles, book reviews, and critiques in some papers through out his whole life. In 1838, his novel *The Narrative of Arthur Gordon Pym of Nantucket* published and in 1839, his *Tales of the Grotesque and Arabesque*.

On January 29, 1845, his "The Raven" appeared in the *Evening Mirror*, a newspaper in New York, and became a popular sensation. It made Poe a household name almost instantly. It suggested that Poe's frequent theme of the "death of a beautiful woman" stems from the repeated loss of women throughout his life.
