CURRENCY

The official currency unit of the UK is the British pound. Although its official name is pound sterling, it is sometimes called a 'quid' in everyday language. One pound has 100 pennies, or pence. If something costs fifty pence, people say it's fifty 'p' (50p).

Banknotes

There are four banknotes in circulation in the UK and all of them have a portrait of Queen Elizabeth on one side. The smallest note is the green and blue £5 note. On the back, it has a portrait of Elizabeth Fry on it, a woman who fought for important social changes in the UK in the 19th century. The orange £10 note has a portrait of British scientist Charles Darwin on it and the purple £20 note features the economist Adam Smith. The largest banknote is the red £50 note with Matthew Boulton and James Watt on the back; together, they improved train travel in the UK. The £50 note isn't seen very often, though!

Coins

Like the banknotes, the British coins all have a portrait of Queen Elizabeth on them. There are eight coins: the 1p, 2p, 5p, 10p, 20p and 50p coins as well as the one and two pound coins. Most of them are round, but the 20p and 50p coins have seven sides. If the design on the back of the first six coins are put together, they form the Royal Shield, which is part of the Royal Coat of Arms – the official symbol of the British monarchy. The designs on the back of the £1 and £2 coins change from time to time. For example, in 2013, the £2 coin celebrated the 150th anniversary of the London underground while in 2015 it celebrated the 100th anniversary of World War I.
