Dolphins are not fish but warm-blooded mammals. They live in groups and speak to each other in their own language. In this was they are like other animals, such as bees and birds. However, their brain is nearly the same size as our own and they live for nearly thirty years.

The Gorilla together with the Giant Panda and the Giant Turtle are at risk of extinction because of the damage to their natural habitat by humans.
