Zero Conditional

It is used to express situations in which the outcome is likely (but not guaranteed) to happen in the future.

First Conditional

Expresses general truths—situations in which one thing *always* causes another.

Second Conditional

It is useful for expressing outcomes that are completely unrealistic or will *not* likely happen in the future.
