More about Giraffes

The giraffe sleeps only when he feels safe and only for short periods of time. He is very alert to unusual noises and awakens quickly. Much of the time he moves slowly about among the trees looking for food, although he can also gallop when he needs to do so. Giraffes have been known to gallop up to forty miles an hour, but usually prefer to move more slowly.

Giraffes eat plants. When foliage is scarce they eat bark. They seldom eat grass.

Giraffes do not moo like cows, neigh like horses, or roar like lions. They are silent animals.

A giraffe's tail is equipped with bunches of fur on the end. This is a handy tool for brushing away flies and other insects. He scratches his neck on tree trunks to relieve itching.

Giraffes sometimes travel in groups but often are found alone. Some have been known to "baby-sit" calves so new giraffe mothers can search for food. Giraffes also seem to enjoy keeping company with zebras, elands, hartebeests, and old elephants. Giraffes become their guards to warn of danger.
