

## ADJECTIVES ENDING IN -ED AND -ING

When we want to describe how I feel we use **-ED** and to talk about the cause of those feelings we use **-ING**.

**Example:** I'm bored because the movie is boring.  
I'm devastated due to this devastating criticism

<b>Worry</b>	Worried	Preocupado	Worrying	Preocupante

**NOTE.** Some "feeling" verbs have an **-ED** adjective but not the **-ING** form, such as:

VERB	I AM -ED!			
<b>Delight</b>	Delighted	Encantado	Delightful	Encantador
<b>Impress</b>	Impressed	Impresionado	Impressive	Impresionante
<b>Offend</b>	Offended	Ofendido	Offensive	Ofensivo
<b>Scare</b>	Scared	Asustado	Scary	De miedo
<b>Stress</b>	Stressed	Estresado	Stressful	Estresante
