RULES	adjective	comparative	RULES	adjective	comparative
1. add -er	tall small	taller than smaller than	1. add “ the -est ”	rich long	the richest the longest
2. drop -y , add -er	lazy happy	lazier happier	2. drop -y , add “ the -iest ”	funny crazy	the funniest the craziest
3. consonant -vowel	fat big	fatter bigger	3. CVC = double the last consonant	fat big	the fattest the biggest
consonant (CVC = double the last consonant)					
4. 2 syllables and more	beautiful dangerous	more beautiful than more dangerous than	4. 2 or more syllables: add “ the most ”	beautiful dangerous	the most beautiful the most dangerous

Comparison of adverbs: add "more" and "the most"

- quickly -> more quickly

Polly runs more quickly than me.

- terribly -> the most terribly.

I cook the most terribly.

Short adjectives: add "-er" and "-est" like adjectives

- early -> earlier

Paul got home earlier than me.

- fast -> the fastest

He ran the fastest.

Irregular adverbs:

well	better	the best
badly	worse	the worst
little	less	the least

I did the best in the race. (well)

2. Kim studies in the whole class. (hard)
3. Fred and Alex are lazy, but Peter works (little)
4. I draw than you. (badly)
