2- A young boy, Shepherd, is <u>getting</u> dressed.				
3- A young <u>boy</u> , Shepherd, is getting dressed.				
4- He is putting on his <u>tackies</u> .				
5- It is very <u>noisy</u> in his house.				
6- It is very noisy in his <u>house</u> .				
7- 'Mongi, <u>give</u> me back my yellow pen!'				
8- 'Mongi, give me back my <u>yellow</u> pen!'				
9- 'Mongi, give me back my yellow <u>pen</u> !'				
10- Mr Motiki's <u>dog</u> is barking at someone coming up the <u>road</u> .				
11- Mr Motiki's dog is <u>barking</u> at someone coming up the road.				
12- Shepherd <u>likes</u> doing things slowly.				

13- Shepherd likes doing things <u>slowly</u> .				
14- He <u>sings</u> a little, then he pulls on his T-shirt.				
15- He sings a little, then he pulls on his <u>T-shirt</u> .				
16- They are very <u>old</u> tackies.				
17- When they were <u>new</u> , they belonged to Mongi.				
18- When they were new, they <u>belonged</u> to Mongi.				
19- But now they have <u>holes</u> in them, and they belong to Shepherd.				
20- Look how she <u>walks</u> a little and then stops to <u>lean</u> on her stick for a while.				
21- Look how she walks a little and then stops to lean on her <u>stick</u> for a while.				
22- Instead he is <u>wagging</u> his tail.				
23- Instead he is wagging his <u>tail</u> .				
24- Gogo is old, but her face <u>shines</u> like new shoes.				
25- Gogo is old, but her face shines like <u>new</u> shoes.
