

Teenager Survives Nine Weeks in the Australian Desert

Matthew Allen, an 18-year-old accounting student, left home without his cell phone, extra clothing or any food. It is believed that he wanted to test his survival skills by living in the wild. After he didn't return home that night, his family got worried and called the police to report that he was missing. Everyone searched for him, but there was no sign of him. It was November and one of the hottest Australian summers on record. Temperatures were so high that bush fires were a constant problem. Weeks went by and his family became more anxious. There was less hope that he was still alive. A police officer working on the case, Uriah Baker, said, "Anyone who is missing for that length of time in those conditions... you wouldn't expect to see them again."

But nine weeks after he disappeared, Matthew was found. He weighed just under forty kilograms, having lost almost half his body weight after so long in the wild. He was covered in bites from mosquitos and other insects when he was rescued. He had lost some of his sight, and was almost blind as a result of not drinking enough water.

Even though he was very sick when they found him, the police could not believe that he had survived for so long with so little food and water. What is even more surprising was that Matthew did not want to be found and had remained hidden from people searching the area. Mr. Baker said, "He must have kept out of the way of us."

How he stayed alive is a mystery. He only had access to small amounts of food and a little water from a near-dry river. He had no tent or shade and was living only on his own skills. He was discovered by two people walking in the area. When they saw him, he was unable to stand because of serious injuries to his feet and legs. He was very confused and did not seem to know where he was. A helicopter was sent immediately to take him to the nearest hospital.

The police department believes that Matthew might have been depressed before leaving home. His mother, Deborah, said that "getting Matthew well" was the only thing that mattered to her family, but she did not want to answer any further questions after the awful time her family had been through.
