The concept of priming includes the idea that the media has an effect on people's judgment and decisions. That is, information can be provided that will draw out people's memories and influence them when they form an evaluation or make a decision. Owing to its nature, priming is particularly useful during elections. Some scholars believe that the priming effect allows the media to influence voters by spreading specific information about a candidate or a political issue. For people who do not understand political matters well, the media is their main source of information. The more access they have to a particular source, the more likely it is that their opinions will be **in accord with** those of the source. Accordingly, the priming effect has become an effective and popular campaign strategy in elections. Candidates and news channels tend to try to use certain events to influence voters. If the voters are unaware of the priming, they are more likely to be led by **it** and accept what they are exposed to as their own opinion.

Fortunately, negative campaigning often alerts voters to paying closer attention to certain issues and candidates. It takes a long time, usually longer than a five-week election campaign, for voters to shift their positions. Therefore, the priming effect often just reinforces people's beliefs rather than changing them.

There have always been mean people in the world, willing to do harm to those around them. The difference these days is that they can hurt far more people than before by making use of the Internet. To avoid suffering from Internet abuse, either financially or emotionally, we need to know about the different types of online bad guys.

There are all kinds of trolls, but among the worst are the online haters. They may be just narrow-minded people, or sexist or racist **bigots**. Such people are only interested in spreading hateful abuse. They may also be cyber bullies that target a particular person, who may even be someone they know in real life. Or they might just be angry, weak people for whom spreading hate is a way of feeling stronger.

It's also important to know something about people who enjoy "phishing," a word formed by combining "phony" with "fishing." Phishers fool their targets with fake emails and websites. Their purpose is to get the personal information of Internet users, which they can then use to steal their money or their identities. Due to the financial threat, they are the most dangerous people online.

Hackers are not always bad. Some of them do valuable work in the field of cyber security. But there are plenty of hackers with evil intentions. Among the worst are "zombie masters." They install remote-control programs onto your computer and take it over so that it does what they want. It then becomes a zombie computer, and may be used to send out junk emails or attack other computers. Hacking is a main threat to online safety, and every computer user should protect themselves against it.

While ultramarathons are the toughest races a runner can face, for a swimmer it is open water that presents the greatest challenges. Open water swimming in a lake, river, or the sea is a very different experience from swimming in a pool. But it is one that every swimmer should try at least once.

Most people who try an open-water swim appreciate the feeling of freedom, as well as the lack of chemicals in the water, and can't help coming out feeling happy and relaxed. The fact that there are plants, fish, and other creatures living in the water adds to the fun. Open water swimming is suitable for any age group as long as people have the confidence and ability to swim without putting their feet down. They just need to remember they will be out of their depth for some, or even all, of the time. That's why it's best not to do it alone.

Open water swimming is also a competitive sport. It has increased in popularity since men's and women's 10-kilometer races were held at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing. Open water races can take place in any large outdoor body of water. They are anywhere from 1 to 80 kilometers in length, but the most common distances are 5 km, 10 km, and 25 km. In Taiwan, the best-known open-water event is an annual 3,000-meter swim held in September at Sun Moon Lake.

Skin cancer is the most common type of cancer in the United States. It is mainly caused by too much exposure to the sun. According to a recent study, 40 to 50 percent of Americans who live to the age of sixty-five will have this disease at least once in their lifetimes. Moreover, more than a million Americans are likely to have skin cancer two hundred years from now. Although more and more people are dying of skin cancer, one person in seven doesn't use sunscreen while out in the sun. We need to know that it is **essential** to protect our skin from being damaged by the sun.

Skin cancer is more common among people who spend a lot of time out in the sun, who have been badly sunburned before, who have light-colored skin, hair, and eyes, who have had a family member with skin cancer, or who are over the age of fifty. Luckily, skin cancer is very rare in children, but overexposure to the sun in childhood can increase the risk of skin cancer later in life. Also, it is commonly said that people with darker skin don't have to worry about skin cancer, but that's not true. In fact, darker-skinned people can also get skin cancer, because the sun's UVA rays are harmful to all skin types and can go into the deepest layers of the skin.

Most types of skin cancer can be cured if treated early. The best way to avoid getting skin cancer is to prevent sunburn. Be sure to reapply sunscreen every two hours, even on cloudy days, and after swimming. Though it is impossible to be completely safe from skin cancer, you can reduce the risk by keeping away from the sun.
