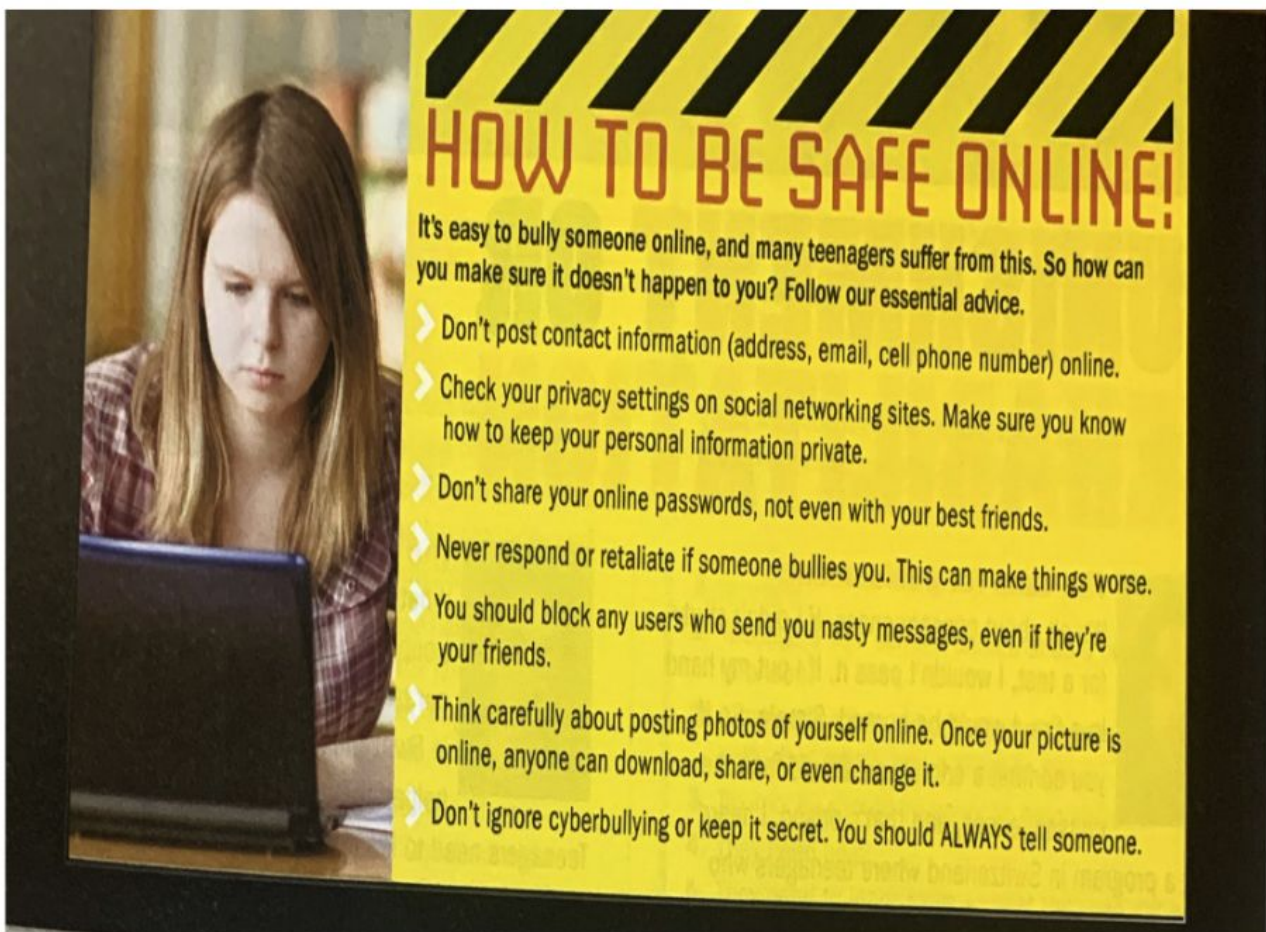

❖ **Focus on CONTENT**

- A list of short, clear pieces of advice

**Giving advice in writing**

**Use the imperative to give advice in writing**

Affirmative: base form

***Block*** people who are rude to you.

Negative: Don't + base form

***Don't forget*** to check your privacy settings

#### **Imperatives**

They are used to give commands or tell people in a strong way what to do. Imperatives are often followed by an exclamation point, for example: Come! Sit! Stop!
