



Space Food



One of the astronauts on Apollo 17, Eugene Cernan, was also in the earlier Gemini program.

The quality and variety of food for the Apollo astronauts were much better than for astronauts on previous missions. Hot water was available, so they could eat ¹both/several freeze-dried foods, and the food was tastier. The astronauts carried special "spoon bowls." ²Several/All of the food stuck to the spoon, making eating seem similar to eating on Earth. ³Both/Several peas and beans were served in sauce, so they didn't fly away. There was also more choice—100 food items including strawberry and peanut cubes, spaghetti, salmon salad, and 75 drinks. Variety is important because ⁴both/most astronauts will get bored of the same menu choices. The astronauts liked ⁵most of/several of the food items apart from freeze-dried ice cream. However, visitors can buy this in the NASA gift shop as "space food" and try it for themselves.

Specialists test ⁶all/all of new foods for their smell. The smell of food is a big worry. In 1976, a terrible food smell caused one Soviet spacecraft to return to Earth before completing the mission!
