


Happy Yorkshire Day



Yorkshire is an area (called a county) in England. It is divided into three parts, called 'ridings' - North Yorkshire, West Yorkshire and South Yorkshire. It is the biggest county in England. The county town is York. Major cities in Yorkshire include Leeds and Sheffield. The emblem of Yorkshire is the white rose. Many Brits go to the Yorkshire seaside on holiday. Holiday resorts include Scarborough and Whitby. Many famous people come from Yorkshire: for example, the Bronte sisters (writers), David



Hockney (artist) and JB Priestley (playwright). Yorkshire people are very proud of their county and they call it 'God's own country'. Famous attractions there are the Dales, Yorkshire Wildlife Park, Doncaster races and Haworth, where the Brontes lived. Let's not forget the Yorkshire pudding, a very tasty dish made with eggs, milk and flour. Yorkshire Day, which celebrates this great county, takes place every year on August 1st. There are all sorts of celebrations: flower and vegetable competitions, talent shows, musical events and displays of Yorkshire history in libraries and town halls.






