The mystery of the *Maria Celeste*



One of the greatest sea mysteries of all time is the disappearance of the 107 foot-long British ship called the *Mary Celeste*. It had left from New York on 5th November 1872 heading for the port of Genoa in Italy. (1) _____

On December 4th, 1872, a lookout on another ship, the *Del Gratia*, spotted the *Mary Celeste* over 600 miles off the coast of Portugal. (2) _____. Strangely, there was no distress signal being displayed either. Oliver Deveau, chief mate of *Del Gratia*, boarded *Mary Celeste* and found it had been abandoned. There was a great deal of water on the ship, but it was not in danger of sinking. The ship was also carrying 1,701 barrels of alcohol which could easily catch fire, but nine of these were found to be empty.

The ship's papers were missing, but the captain's logbook, which is a book where information about the ship's journey is recorded, was untouched. The clock was not functioning, the compass was destroyed, and other equipment used for finding direction was missing. (3) _____. The rope used for the main sail could not be found either. However, another rope was found tied to the back of the *Celeste* with one end hanging in the water many metres behind the ship.

All personal belongings of the captain and crew were still on the ship and there were no signs of a fight or any sort of violence. What was clear was that the captain and crew had left the ship in a hurry. (4) _____. There have been many theories over the years, but as yet, none of these have been proven.

Some people have suggested that bad weather forced the crew to abandon the ship and take refuge in the lifeboat. (5) _____. Both of these theories do not sound so convincing because there were no signs of damage to the ship.

One of the most believable theories is that the flammable alcohol from the nine barrels leaked out and the captain thought that the ship was going to explode. He ordered everybody on board into the lifeboat and then tied the lifeboat to the back of the ship, so that he could observe the situation from there. That can explain why there was a long rope attached to the back of the ship. (6) _____. Unfortunately, the rope must have broken or somehow become untied.

We may never know what happened to the crew of the *Maria Celeste*, but there certainly are a number of theories. One thing we do know is that no trace of the lifeboat or any of the crew has ever been found.

- A. Others think that a tsunami or 'rogue wave' came through and washed the captain and crew overboard, perhaps with little warning.
- B. If the threat of explosion passed, they would still have the option of climbing back on board the *Mary Celeste*.
- C. However, it never reached its destination and Captain Benjamin Briggs, his wife and daughter and an experienced crew of seven were never seen again.
- D. The ship was not travelling in a clear direction, its sails were damaged and there was no sign of anybody on board.
- E. The question is, what made the crew abandon the ship so quickly?
- F. The captain had had a similar experience just one year earlier.
- G. The only lifeboat, which was stored on top of the main entrance to the storage area, was also missing.
