

We use **AS + ADJECTIVE + AS** to say that **TWO things or people** are the **SAME** (= equal) in some characteristic.

Examples:



- The chair is **as expensive as** the table. (= They have the same price).
- My brother is **as old as** me. (= We are the same age because we are twins).

We use **NOT AS + ADJECTIVE + AS** to say that **TWO things or people** are **DIFFERENT** in some way.

Examples:



- The two-star hotel isn't **as big as** the four-star hotel. (= The four-star hotel is bigger.)
- I'm **not as clever as** him. (= He is cleverer than me.)



We use **he** for one boy or one man.

Dad = he

We use **she** for a one girl or one woman.

Mum = she

We use **it** for one thing or one animal.

a table = it

a dog = it

We use **they** for groups of people, animals and things.

Mum and Dad = they

two boys = they

two girls = they

two dogs = they

two tables = they
