COMPARATIVE ADJECTIVES

Read the examples and the explanations:

I'm **older than** my brother Tim, but he's **bigger than** me.

I think he's **funnier** and **more intelligent than** me. But his spelling's **worse than** mine.



spelling = the ability to write words with the correct letters in the correct order.



We use comparative adjectives to compare two people or things.

- For short adjectives, we add -er (than). Be careful of the spelling: $old \rightarrow older$ (than) $big \rightarrow bigger$ (than) $pretty \rightarrow prettier$ (than)
- For long adjectives, we use more (than): careful → more careful (than) intelligent → more intelligent (than)
- These comparative adjectives are irregular: good → better (than) bad → worse (than)
