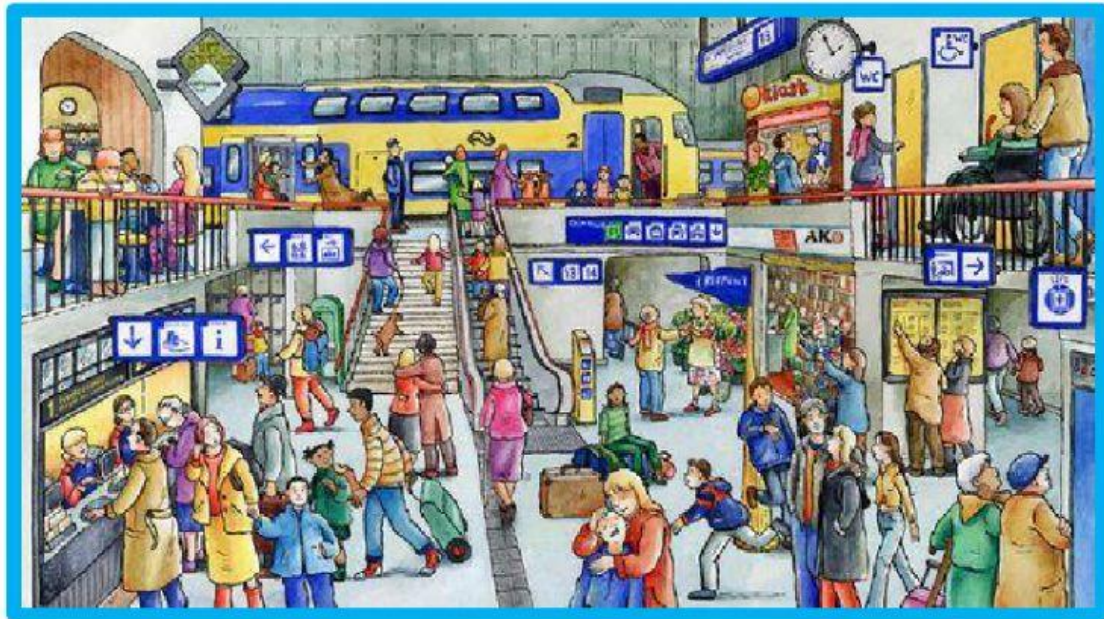


At the train station
